SCOUT SECTION REPORT 2013/14

I am pleased to report that this year has again been another eventful, enjoyable and successful twelve months in the life of the Troop.

The highlight of the year was undoubtedly the Annual Summer Camp held at the Bonaly Scout Centre outside Edinburgh from 27 July - 3 August. In changeable summer weather there was more fun, excitement and adventure to be had.

Camping skills displayed were generally very good and the 11 lucky attendees were treated to a first-rate range of activities and trips. Activities included grass sledging, pedal karting, Geocaching, laserquest, camp olympics and swimming. There were interesting visits to the National Mining Museum, to the National Museum of Flight at East Fortune, and Edinburgh Zoo.

Well-attended camps were also held during the year at Silverdale at Spring Bank Holiday, indoors at Great Tower in January, and the Group Camp at Silverdale.

We tried, as ever, during the year to put on a balanced, interesting and exciting programme mixing the learning of scouting skills with progress award work, outdoor events and, of course, lots of games! Indoor highlights included foreign cooking, the annual super-scout competition and a visit to Heysham Power Station, whilst out of doors there were wide games, an overnight stay on Helvellyn, an 'Iron Man' event, a survival skills camp, kayaking on the canal, the ever-popular chip survey, remembrance Sunday hike to Castle Crag in Borrowdale, a New Year biking expedition, hikes to Nicky Nook in October and Beacon Fell. The Group again took part in Scout Community Week with the Scouts painting benches and tables at the Hospice. More recently, for our Global Challenge Award we participated for the first time in a novel event entering a team in the North West Scouts Shelterbox Scavenger Hunt in Liverpool supporting the Shelterbox project.

There has been excellent progress in the training scheme, with a number of scouts gaining a variety of Challenge and Activity badges. The highest training award in the Scout Section, the Chief Scout's Gold Award, has been gained by Alexander Whyte, Ben Penny, Sol Wilkinson, Daniel Rawlinson, Jaidan Reeder and Lewis MacPherson We will continue to promote the fullest possible use of training themes in our programmes.

On the competition front, 2013 was once more a successful year. We were placed 2nd and 6th in the County Crew Challenge. We participated in the County Orienteering event at Beacon Fell, finishing in 1st and 2nd places in the under 15 section, and taking 1st place in the inter-troop trophy. We came a very creditable 4th place in the Bowlander County Hiking Competition, we took 2nd place in the Swimming Gala and lastly, we won both trophies in the Annual Lonsdale Knight Activity Competition. Success in the competitions based on scouting skills is particularly gratifying representing as it does the putting into practice of expertise gained mainly within the Troop.

The year saw Troop numbers dropping slightly, presently 21, and history was made when our first girl joined the Troop. It is pleasing to record that several former members have moved on to Explorer Scouts.
